

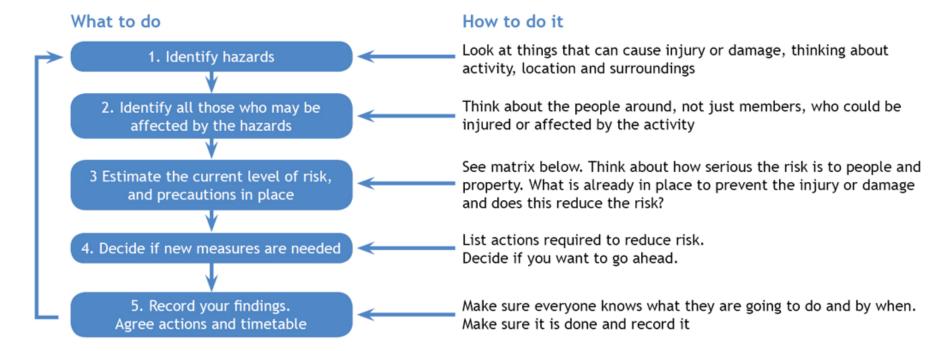
## Risk Assessment: Event/Activity

Using this template, you should risk assess activities, trips and events in line with Girlguiding's Risk Assessment Policy. Using the information on the website and this cover page, you should be able to identify effective risk management strategies and tasks to ensure that activities run safely and effectively.

For more information or support with risk assessments, please speak to your local commissioner.

- Hazards are anything that has the potential to cause harm (e.g. cars, trip hazards, exposed electrical wires, theft, etc.).
- Risk is the likelihood of something happening, combined with the severity of the harm that could be caused by one or more hazards

Risk management is a dynamic cycle that needs to be repeated in order to effectively manage risk. The frequency of reassessment will depend on activity, and new risks could occur that have not previously been assessed. In this instance, a dynamic risk assessment is required.

Inability of participants to steer	Bystanders – accident, injury  Participant – veering off course into the archery range	Shown how to steer and brake, so they remain on the activity slope.  Participants to walk back up on the left (facing up hill). No other participants to be situated on the slope.  Archery minimum range distances observed. Long grass on fence line slows participants down if they're veering off course.	Low	Medium	Group leader supervision  Archery instructors aware to be watchful and call a stop to the activity if required.	Group leader – ongoing Archery instructors – ongoing

Asthma or breathing problems	Participants / group adults – asthma attack	It is recommended inhalers are carried by participants/adults as they will be walking up the hill several times in one session.	Low	Low	Adult supervision and monitoring	Group leader – ongoing
Extreme weather	All – sunburn, hypothermia, hyperthermia	Deer Park team to check weather forecast prior to activity. If necessary, change plans or cancel the activity.  Ensure participants have suitable and adequate clothing including sun protection.	Low	Low		Deer Park team – prior to each session

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Wasps	All – stings	A check for the presence of wasp nests should be done prior to any session. Any evidence of a nest should be reported to the Deer Park team as soon as possible.	Low	Low		Group leader – prior to session
Lack of 1 <sup>st</sup> aid provision	All – worsening injury	Activity is group leader led and therefore the visiting group is responsible for having a suitably qualified 1st aider and a 1st aid kit.	Low	Low		Group leader – prior to the activity starting
