


Risk assessment Including coronavirus considerations

Using this template, you should risk assess activities, trips and events in line with Girlguiding's risk assessment policy. Using the information on the website and this cover page, you should be able to identify effective risk management strategies and tasks to ensure that activities run safely and effectively.

For more information or support with risk assessments, please speak to your local commissioner.

- Hazards are anything that has the potential to cause harm (e.g. cars, trip hazards, exposed electrical wires, theft, etc.).
- Risk is the likelihood of something happening, combined with the severity of the harm that could be caused by one or more hazards

Risk management is a dynamic cycle that needs to be repeated in order to effectively manage risk. The frequency of reassessment will depend on activity, and new risks could occur that have not previously been assessed. In this instance, a dynamic risk assessment is required.



Make sure everyone knows what they are going to do and by when. Make sure it is done and record it.

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Animal faeces, dead animals, etc.	All – illness	Wear protective (e.g. garden) gloves. Creosote	All – injury/illness (skin contact and inhalation can cause rash and irritation, can affect the nervous system)	Users must wear gloves and eye protection when creosoting. If the substance gets onto the skin or in the eyes, follow the instructions on the packaging immediately. COSHH details checked and readily available.	Low	Medium	When creosoting elements a distance from the water supply (eg the zip wire), a large bottle of water should be taken as part of the first aid provision to flush the area in the first instance before heading to the bottom of the hill for further treatment. Creosoting is always supervised by an experienced Deer Park team member.	Deer Park team – briefing & ongoing when creosoting in progress
Paint	All – inhalation of fumes	Users must wear masks when painting in an enclosed space. Doors/windows opened where possible. Where possible, water- based paints are used. Infectious diseases, such as Covid-19	All attendees from illness after contracting a disease.	Anyone confirmed to have a contagious disease or symptoms of, is to inform their corporate's main contact and to stay away from the centre. Where first aid is required, injured person to administer where possible. PPE to be worn if first aider needs to be closer than lm. Hand sanitizer available if no running hot water.
